Celebrity doodles expected to draw generous crowd

Do you doodle?

If so, you're not alone, So do Vincent Price and Charlton Heston, not to mention Paul Newman

Chances are your doodles aren't particularly valuable. But theirs are. The Back Alley Theatre in Van Nuys learned that last year, when it made more than \$10,000 at its first Doodle Auction.

The event will be repeated Sonday afternoon at the Sherman Caks estate of Jerry Berns, 13232 Magnolia Blvd. About 70 celebrity deodles will be auctioned off at the affair, which will also feature a buffet dinner and open bar.

Details of the auction, like the items themselves, are sketchy. But the doodles will be available for viewing beginning at 3 p.m., and the bidding will begin around 4:45 p.m.

Michael Nadar of "Dynasty" will reprise his role as celebrity auctioneer. Former Los Angeles Raider Lyle Alzado also will be on hand.

The most money spent on a single doodle last year was \$675, according to Laura Zucker, producing director of the Back Alley. That went for a pen-and-ink drawing by Charlton Heston.

Zucker stressed, however, that many of the drawings went for far less money. A Dick Clark doxdle sold for only \$15.


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
